HOW DOES THE ORTHODOX CHURCH VIEW SCRIPTURE & TRADITION?

Christianity originated from the ministry of Jesus Christ and was established as the Way of life once it was spread throughout the world by His disciples. We know that as time progressed, various branches of Christianity came into being created by divisions of the church. Although all these branches believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God and came to this world for the redemption of our sins, there are several differences in matters of faith and worship that exist. As members of the Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church, we are taught at an early age that "Orthodox" means "right praise or glorification of God" in its most simplistic definition. According to the Collins Dictionary, the word orthodox is defined in further detail as "conforming to the usual beliefs or established doctrines..." when used as an adjective. When breaking down this definition, we see that the word "orthodox" can be broken down into two parts. "Usual beliefs" signifies tradition, or things that are passed down either within family or other close-knit groups. "Established doctrines" in Christianity references the Holy Bible, or Holy Scriptures and other traditions. In relation to the Orthodox Church, the definition implies that the faith of the church is based on both direct references to the Holy Scriptures as well as traditional beliefs and practices that have been passed down across many generations.



In his letter to the Romans, St. Paul discusses the importance of the Old Testament for guidance. Romans 15:4 states "For whatever things were written before were written for our learning, that we through the patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope". As such, there are several occasions during the divine liturgy as well as daily prayers of the Orthodox Church where portions of the Old Testament are read. In the divine liturgy, select portions are read to prepare the worshippers for the Holy Qurbana. Robert Allen is a noted author and subject matter expert of the divisions or branches of Christianity. Mr. Allen wrote that the Orthodox Church doesn't "believe Scripture is open to individual interpretation". He further states that "Orthodox Christians believe the Bible is God's word, revealed for the salvation of humanity". This is a very powerful statement as to the importance of scripture to the Orthodox Church. In a sense, our liturgy can be viewed as a journey through the Holy Bible, beginning with portions of the Old Testament and then reaching the climax of the service in the dispensation of the Holy Communion, signifying the events of the Last Supper.

In the context of the Holy Scriptures, the word "tradition" ('paradosis' in Greek) means "handed down". Both written and unwritten forms of our Holy Scripture were passed down during the experiences of our saints and forefathers. In 2 Thessalonians 2:14-15 it says, "To which He called you by our gospel, for the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, brethren, stand fast and hold the traditions which you were taught, whether by word or our epistle.". Here, St. Paul emphasizes the importance of keeping the traditions that were passed on to us by our ancestors, through writings or by word of mouth. Many ask whether we have evidence that these 'oral traditions' are based on the Holy Scriptures. When we look at the life of Aaron (brother of Moses), we see that God conferred the priesthood to him and his male descendants. It is mentioned how Aaron's sons became priests following the instruction and lessons from their father. From this, we see an example of tradition being passed down to generations - the priesthood of Aaron ranks as one of the most important told in the Bible. St. John the Theologian explains that it is difficult to have a written account of every disciple's experiences. Instead, they have been preserved through "the life of the church", passed on through the generations.


The Orthodox Church can rightfully pride itself for adhering to the true faith as taught by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Our worship is strengthened by the fact that our roots are derived from the holy scriptures. The practices of our church fathers are based in Tradition, much of which we can proudly trace back to the disciples of Christ. For us as members of the Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church, we feel great pride in the most recent consecration of HH Moran Mar Baselios Mathews III as the 9th Catholicos of the East and 22nd Malankara Metropolitan. The holy father sits on the throne of St. Thomas as the 92nd Primate, a testament to the Tradition that continues to this day.

the Unwise

The saying, "Weeds growing by any water or riverbank will be plucked out before any grass" is a very conceptual verse as found in the Bible (Wisdom of Sirach 40:16). This means that those who commit evil are more likely to fail than those who do good. Weeds thrive in stagnant water and are unwelcome in man-made environments like farm fields, gardens, lawns, and parks. When weeds invade your lawn, they compete for air, water, and nutrients with healthy, desirable grass. As a result, grass plants become weaker, exposing your lawn to diseases, pest infestations, and drought. So you see, weeds negatively impact landscapes and can do major damage by taking up important resources, such as light, nutrients, soil, space, and water, that desired plants need. Getting rid of



These weeds symbolize evil people who try to take control of faithful and good people. They plot negativity and hatred in their hearts and don't care about positivity. That is why they fail easier than others, though at some points they may seem to be succeeding. Wicked people fail more easily than people who show righteousness because their sin makes them imperfect and erroneous. This is why wicked people (weeds) fail or get "plucked out" before any other people (grass).

The following story depicts the Bible verse, "Weeds growing by any water or riverbank will be plucked out before any grass."

There were once two boys named Luke and James who knew each other well and lived in the same conditions and same town. Luke was a bright boy, always thinking of positivity, and was respectful to others. James, however, was different because he was a bad boy and didn't like to go by the rules. James took his parents for granted and liked to blame innocent people for getting into trouble. One day, when Luke and James were going to school, James decided to push Luke into a pond nearby as they were going to school. Their school prohibited any wet clothes and was strict about their rules. James knew that this was an opportunity to get Luke in trouble, and he snuck up behind him, fast but very quiet. However, when he was about to push Luke into the pond to his left, there was a big red ant pile below him. James noticed it before his second leg was able to hit the ground, but before he could take out his leg, the shoe stepped on the red ant's pile.



The ants started crawling on James, into his shoes, and there were so many of them, biting and crawling, on his leg that James started walking backward into the angle of the pond. With his leg slipping off balance, he fell into the pond himself. James, disappointed as ever, had no choice but to go to school in wet clothes. Unfortunately, Luke had almost reached school, and the elders were nearby, so pushing him wasn't an option for James. And, even with the summer sun shining on him, the water and mud on him didn't dry. When he walked past the front office of his school, the principal stopped him and gave him a detention slip for after school. He was also late and got a tardy slip from the principal. However, when the principal was talking to him about how he should never come to the school with dirty and muddy clothes ever again, a red ant climbed on top of her leg, and unfortunately, as she finally glanced at it, she saw the biggest swollen bump on her leg that she has ever seen in her life. The principal made a slight shriek and glared at James, who was trying to look innocent. The principal ordered James to go to the nurse's office to get changed into new clothes and guaranteed him two weeks of detention instead of one day.

That same day, with new clothes on, James entered his math class and was ordered to sit next to the student who got the "Outstanding Student of the Month" award in the class: Luke. Luke noticed that James wasn't wearing the clothes that he wore in the morning on the way to school when he was walking behind him. However, Luke knew better than to ask him and didn't dare say a word to James. James, however, had enough disappointment for the day, and he was plotting to take revenge on innocent Luke either after school, on the walk home, or in math class itself. James decided that he could avenge himself after school on the walk home because there, teachers wouldn't be watching their every move to find any guilt. In the meantime, however, James decided that he should make the most of it by sitting next to Luke, and he agreed to himself that he could copy off of Luke's answers, for there was a major test that day. When the teacher gave out the test sheet, Luke started calculating immediately, while James, pretending that he was thinking, glanced at Luke's paper every ten seconds. James planned to copy Luke every time he circled an option for the multiple-choice section, and then write in fake numbers and calculations for the section where you have to show your work. He also made sure to make it look realistic and added the answer number as the circled answer in his work.

From this story, we can learn how those who do bad things (weeds) will fail and get "plucked out" before any good and obedient people. This is because when bad people make their mistakes, they are getting one step closer to trouble, demonstrating that, even if these bad people appear to be successful at times, God will always care for those who listen to and obey his word by not engaging in any bad deeds or sin, leading them to success and away from failure. David stated in Psalms 57:6, "they have dug a pit before me, into the midst, whereof they have fallen themselves." This relates to how James fell into the muddy pond himself, though he had initially planned on pushing Luke into the pond, and it shows that God will never purposely allow his good people to fall into despair and embarrassment and that he will always care for them. This makes the evil people more likely to fail or be "plucked out" before anyone who does good.



James, however, as said before, didn't like to play by the rules, and wasn't obedient to the framework of the rules and regulations. Question by question, James copied Luke until, at question 18, came the free-response questions. explanation will be able to understand what he wrote. In total, there were 28 questions on the test, 11 of which were free-response questions. 






Oblivious Jealousy (Story) Aleena Basil_Chatsworth(West)

The pain and suffering they experienced over the years were evident on their faces. During the drive, we didn't talk much, his mom and dad said they were very thankful for what we were doing, but Wes didn't talk at all. I guess a few years of jail can do that to someone. Needless to say that they were very thankful for taking them in and giving them a place to stay. It's incredible to think how much we've changed over the years.

I saw Wes walk outside and look at what was once his house. When I saw him look over there I remember all the things that happened..... About five or six years ago, my family and I just moved into the neighbourhood. Wes and his family had been there since he was born. They were good neighbors to us and they were also great friends. It turns out Wes went to the same high school that I decided to go to. Wes's full name is Weston William Parker. He was the first friend I made here. It was great because we talked about all of our common interests. After a few days, he and I did practically everything together. Our friendship brought our parents and family together as well. It turns out our families could also be really good friends, going to church together, on vacations, and doing all sorts of stuff together.

After we graduated high school, we both went to the same college. When we were deciding what majors we were going to pursue he said he wanted to be an entrepreneur, and I said I wanted to go into the medical field and become a doctor. While this caused some division between us, it wasn't enough to change anything about our friendship, until one day....Wes's dad was a pretty successful executive in the company he worked at, and he got a promotion which changed their lifestyle. The sudden burst of income and more money to spend caused Wes, who was already pretty lavish and laid-back to embrace these bad qualities of his. "Wes, I'm telling you shouldn't spend this way. You're wasting it." Wes responded," Luzio, I'm the economics major, not you, and I know how to spend my money, so you better stay out of my business." Exchanges like this occurred more and more frequently. After a while I just stopped seeing Wes, in general. I also noticed didn't even come to church, not just him but no one from his family did. I realized Wes,my best friend, had ghosted me.

I was angry, so he decided he didn't need my friendship just because he didn't know how to spend money and because I told him that. After a while, I heard my parents talking about how being rich caused Wes's family to be very prominent in the church's affairs which was pretty biased because they rarely even came to church.

During this time I really started focusing on my studies while I heard that Wes was not performing so well. Usually, I would have helped him but I was fed up with his arrogance. One day asked my father why was life so unfair and how rich Wes and his family had become. We were still barely scraping along and he said "Son, I want you to remember these Bible verses; Cut the rich man in his humiliation because as a flower of the field he will pass away. For no sooner has the sun risen.....(St. James 1:10-11), Wherever arrogance enters, there is also dishonor, But the mouth of the humble mediates on wisdom. (Proverbs 11:2), and the last one struck me the most, of course, I wouldn't understand it until much later. "Weeds growing by any water or riverbank will be plucked out before any grass." I thought that some hardships would make him realize how much of a good friend that I was. It turns out I was wrong. I wish I helped him earlier because Wes was very misguided with no one to tell him what was wrong. He started to drink a lot and one day he was driving while being drunk, crashing into a store. A lot of people got hurt. Not only was Wes a drunk driver, but he also endangered people's lives.

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His dad had to take a few weeks of leave to deal with the legal ramifications. He also paid for the hospital fees of all the people injured. In order to pay for all the damage that was inflicted on the store, he asked all his friends and colleagues but they said they couldn't help. Wes's dad in desperation sold their house. I only learned this until later because at the time I was away for my medical internship.

When I returned, Wes's sentence was nearing its end. My dad and I convinced mom and Olivia to take his family in for a few weeks and help them get up on their feet. "Hey, Luzio " I snapped out of my flashback and saw my dad standing beside me at the doorway. After years of separation, our two families talked with each other a lot, prayed, and ate dinner together. Wes's mom praised my mom for her cooking skills and said, "this is some of the best food I have ever tasted." We tried our best to make them feel comfortable at our house.

After a few months, the Parker family was starting to put themselves back together. Mr Parker and Mrs Parker started going to work again and Wes put his unwise tendencies behind him and became a very responsible student and continued his college career which had been interrupted by the accident.

Now, do you understand what I meant earlier about not understanding my dad's wise words until later on? You should never be jealous of those who gain success quickly because they could lose it just as fast...

"My brethren, count it all joy when you face various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience." (St. James 1:2) To paraphrase, only success built upon patience and effort will last.

THE VISIBLE MEANS OF INVISIBLE GRACE

As Orthodox Christians, two essential tools of our faith are sacraments and scriptures. To achieve our ultimate goal of entering the heavenly kingdom, we must first take part in the sacrament and meditate on the scriptures. When we do this, we reach Theosis and become more like God. What makes Orthodoxy unique compared to other denominations of Christianity is that

we have a much more traditional belief system. Sacraments based Scriptures. are on The Scriptures combine wisdom and knowledge of both the Old Testament and New Testament. Another thing that sets us apart from other denominations of Christianity is that we see and believe the Bible to be the given form of God's word. The Holy Scriptures is a collection of books written over multiple centuries, by

those inspired by God to do so. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (St.John 1:1). We, Orthodox Christians, believe the Word of God to be Jesus and it was affirmed by St. John at the beginning of his gospel as well as in his first letter in St. John1:1-4. Scriptures are our guide and book of laws and rules on how to live as good Christians. In fact, there is even a section of books in the old testament called the Books of the Law. "Receive utterance from his mouth and lay up his words in your heart. If you return and humble yourself before the Lord, you have caused

For further understanding on why this is important, we must look at what St. James says in St. James 2:17: Faith without actions or work is equivalent to death and is meaningless. The sacraments of the Orthodox Church are composed of prayers, hymns, scripture lessons, gestures, and

> processions. Many parts of the services date back to the time of the Apostles. Baptism is the first of sacraments that we receive. It builds a foundation for our spiritual growth and helps us start to build connection with God. The one sacrament that is most connected to Holy Baptism is Holy Chrismation. In it, we are anointed by the Holy Chrism Oil. "Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God." (John 3:5). The most

important sacrament among them all is Holy Qurbana which is also known as the Sacrament of Sacraments. Holy Qurbana is the sacrament we participate in the most often. Holy Confession erases our sins because we are able to repent and admit them as our mistakes. Holy Matrimony is a threshold we cross in our spiritual life; it makes the family into a miniature church. Holy Unction is a mystery in which someone who is sick physically, spiritually, or emotionally is anointed and healing grace is imparted. Holy Ordination is when the specially chosen ones embark on a divine path to be

 emissaries of God. All of these sacred practices give us the qualifications to enter the heavenly kingdom.

Not only do the sacraments and scriptures disclose and reveal God to us, but they also serve to make us receptive to God's wisdom and virtue. This is theosis and Christianity in general. They both also affect our personal relationship with God and with one another. The Holy Spirit works through the sacraments and scriptures in order to connect with mankind and broaden our understanding of faith and union with The Lord. Both the scriptures as well as the sacraments either directly reenact or demonstrate what Jesus Christ did or preached about. In truth, both Sacraments and Scriptures connect us to Jesus Christ himself.

The Scriptures and Sacraments are immensely important tools of our faith and allow us to be true Christians and followers of God. They are so quintessential to our faith that it is hard to believe what our faith and holy days and processions would look like without them. Having faith and being truly devoted to that faith is great but as St. James wrote in his letter, faith without works or action is dead. I have chosen to believe that this death is not the physical or mortal way of death, but spiritual and divine death in which one loses their connection to God to such a point it may seem unrepairable. But remember this, our God is a gracious and compassionate God who will always leave a way for us to return to Him. The way Jesus and His disciples left us behind is the Church. It is similar to the ladder we see in Jacob's vision in Genesis 28:12 because it serves as a connection to God. While the ladder is something illusionary and inaccessible, the scriptures and sacraments through and in the Church are very real and accessible making them the best way to become one and communicate with our Lord.




