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LITURGICAL Seasons

My Beloved Children,



As we approach the end of this liturgical year and move towards the new liturgical year this November, let us thank God for the blessings He has provided for us in our spiritual life. In the Indian Orthodox Church, the liturgical calendar holds utmost importance. This serves as a guide for the church's worship and spiritual life, providing a structured framework for the celebration of the feasts, fasts, and seasons throughout the year.

We will begin the liturgical new year by sanctifying and dedicating ourselves through the feasts of Koodosh Etho and Hoodosh Etho. To explain further, the liturgical period is divided into seven seasons:

- 1. Season of Annunciation From Koodosh Etho to Yeldho (Christmas/Feast of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ)
- 2. Season of Epiphany From Yeldho to the beginning of the Great Lent
- 3. Season of Great Lent 50 days of the Great Lent
- 4. Season of Resurrection Feast of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ to Feast of Pentecost
- 5. Season of Pentecost Feast of Pentecost to the Feast of Transfiguration
- 6. Season of Transfiguration From the Feast of Transfiguration to the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross
- 7. Season of Holy Cross From Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross to Koodosh Etho

Following the feast days and fasting days of the Church holds great significance in our lives. These observances serve as a means to deepen our faith, foster a sense of community, and embrace a disciplined lifestyle. Feast days commemorate the lives of revered saints, biblical events, and the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. They provide an opportunity for all of us to reflect on these sacred moments, seek divine blessings, and draw inspiration from the spiritual legacies left behind. Fasting days, on the other hand, are periods of self-denial and purification, where we abstain from certain foods and engage in intensified prayer and introspection. By observing these fasts, we aim to cultivate self-control, humility, and a closer connection with God. Moreover, participating in these communal practices strengthens the bond among one another, fostering unity and a shared sense of identity. Overall, the observance of feast days and fasting days in the Church nurtures spirituality, promotes religious devotion, and enriches our lives as a whole.

The liturgical calendar plays a vital role in nurturing the spiritual growth of the faithful. As followers of Jesus Christ, we need discipline in our spiritual life. Koodosh Eetho and Hoodosh Eetho

Do you know why I wished you all a happy new year in the month of October? According to the liturgical calendar of our Church, our liturgical year starts with Koodosh Eetho. Koodosh Eetho is the first Sunday and Hoodosh Eetho is the second Sunday of the year. Koodosh Eetho is the eighth Sunday before Christmas or the Sunday after October 29. Do you know that we have seven major seasons? Nativity, Epiphany, The Great Lent, Resurrection, Pentecost, Transfiguration and The Holy Cross?

Koodosh Eetho means "the sanctification of the Church" and Hoodosh Eetho means "the dedication of the Church". The term sanctify means "to set apart and to make holy". So, the Koodosh Eetho reminds us about the sanctification of the Church, including us. Koodosh Eetho ensures the physical and spiritual sanctification of the faithful. The faithful purify themselves and the parishes for the worship. It is an annual renewal. Since it is a new year we should make ourselves prepared to step into it. We all are called to be holy and sanctified. But as earthly men, we continue to sin because of our fallen nature, and we have lost the image and likeness of God. So we require sanctification. By taking the divine properties of God, one can become holy. Then only can we restore the image of God.

The second Sunday is Hoodosh Eetho Sunday which means, "the dedication of the Church". The temple of Jerusalem, built by King Solomon, was destroyed by King Nebuchadnezzar. After its destruction, it was rebuilt by Ezra and Nehemiah. But again, the temple was destroyed, and King Herod rebuilt it again.



In BC 170, the Syrian King Antiochus Epiphanous waged a war and invaded the city of Jerusalem. Many were massacred and many were made captives. The worship in the temple was obstructed. He defiled the holy altar by sacrificing a female swine on it. In 164 BC, Jews retrieved the temple from the Greeks and they renovated the temple. They rededicated and made the rededication a great celebration as their mark of joy of freedom. They illuminated the temple and their houses with light and the feast came to be known as the "festival of lights". We can read it in the book of Maccabees.

By celebrating the Hoodosh Eetho every year, we renew and dedicate ourselves as the light of the world. We use different words for this in different situations. Home = Housewarming (sanctifying), Person = Baptism, and Church = Consecration.

So, we must ask ourselves the question, "Are we living a life according to the call or not?". We must realize our call. Both the days of Koodosh Eetho and Hoodosh Eetho remind us of the importance of sanctification and dedication. May the Holy Spirit guide us. May God Almighty bless us all.

Saint John Chrysostom once said, "As a moth gnaws a garment, so doth envy consumes a man." In this saying, the two comparisons are being stated. A moth is a fairly tiny creature that is incapable of devouring something quickly. Rather, they slowly feed and consume. Similarly, so does envy for a man. It is a gradual consumption. Envy consumes a person over time and is a toxic emotion to be the owner of.

In the Bible, envy is one of the seven deadly sins. In Genesis, we are told of the story of Cain killing his brother, Abel, because he was envious of Abel's sacrifice to God. In Peter 2:1, we read, "Laying aside all malice, all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and all evil- speaking, as newborn babies desire the pure milk of the Word, that you may grow thereby, if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is gracious." As faithful Christians, we should crave for the scripture teachings and the Word of God as we depend on them so much. Additionally, Proverbs 23:17 states, "Do not let your heart envy sinners, but be in fear of the Lord the whole day long." The Bible teaches us to stay fearful of the Lord's judgment against us.

In summary, envy is a poison that gradually destroys a person and their energy. Envy and jealousy form and start with someone having certain negative opinions about someone or something. 


GODLYBROTHER

Prayer

"Prayer is the place of refuge for every worry, a foundation by cheerfulness, a source of constant happiness, a protection against sadness," said by St. John Chyrsostom.

This is an important part of a Christian's life. Prayer is when one or more multiple individuals present themselves to God. St. John Chrysostom, the Patriarch of Constantinople, also known as the "Golden Tongue" once said, "Prayer is a refuge for every worry, a foundation for cheerfulness, a source of constant happiness, and a protection against sadness."

What does this mean? Quotes are often hard to understand but in this essay, you will fully understand the meaning of this quote.

The first part of this quote says that prayer is a refuge for worry. I'm sure we all have had worries. That's okay! Even great figures in the Bible have had worries. They all overcame it by prayer. For example, when God told Moses to free the Israelites from the Pharoah, he was worried. He didn't know how he was going to free multitudes and take them to the promised land. Also, many people came and presented their worries to Jesus when he was on Earth.

One example of this is Jairus, the synagogue leader. When his daughter was at the point of death, he pleaded with Jesus to save her. When we are worried we should also ask God to help us overcome it.

The second part says that prayer is a foundation for cheerfulness. Cheerfulness means that you are noticeably happy and optimistic. The prophets, disciples, and some early Church Fathers were all persecuted for their belief in God. However, they remained cheerful. Why? They knew that they had lived a prayerful life so their reward would be granted in heaven. Psalm 34:17 says, "When the righteous cry for help, the Lord delivers them from their troubles." For example, St. Stephen, the first martyr, remained cheerful when he was being stoned to death. He saw the kingdom of God open up and Jesus sitting on His heavenly throne. We pray that we can also remain cheerful in our hard times.

Prayer is also a constant source of happiness. In the Bible, Psalm 27: 4 says, "Seek your happiness in the Lord and He will give you your heart's desire." Our constant source of happiness is God. We were all created in the Image of God, so we have a great amount of happiness in us. However, sometimes our happiness gets covered up because of the hate and anger of this world. We pray to God to lead us away from the hate and anger so that we can be loving and forgiving Christians.

Lastly, the quote says that prayer is protection against sadness. We are human, so we will have some bad days in our lives. Sometimes our sadness can get extreme. In some people, extreme sadness can cause depression which can have a negative impact on your life.

Psalm 30:2 says, "O Lord my God, I have cried unto you and you have healed me." Jesus, on Gethsemane, prayed to His Father because he knew that he was going to go through His Passion. Praying at that time comforted Him. We should do this too! When we are going through sad and troubling days, we should pray to get comfort.

In conclusion, prayer is an important aspect of our lives. Even Jesus prayed during his earthly life. He prayed before performing miracles, in the morning, and even on the Cross! Philippians 4:6 says, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, pray and petition, with thanksgiving, and present your requests to the Lord." We should always set aside time to pray, even if we are tired. Leading a prayerful life can lead you to the Kingdom of God.
